Rotary Clubs throughout Northeastern NJ are getting into the beat by Bonnie Sirower

With the help of the IFRM Foundation, Rotary Clubs throughout Rotary District 7490 (Bergen, Passaic and Hudson Counties) have involved more than 1,000 Senior Citizens in our area in Drum Circles. We now have four Rotary clubs in our District running monthly (or more) drum circles for Senior Citizens in nursing homes, memory care centers, Senior Centers and libraries, with five more clubs planning to start their own drum circles by the end of the year.

Drum Circles are fun activities in which people of all ages join together to make beautiful music using percussion instruments of all kinds. Led by a trained Drum Circle Facilitator, they involve all participants a way that is adjusted to the capabilities of each person attending. People of all ages really enjoy drum circles. One of our trained drum circle facilitators will lead the participants in a variety of fun exercises that will involve all sorts of percussion instruments, including those you bang on, those you shake, those you ring.

Being part of a drum circle enhances one's feelings of well-being, improves ability to concentrate and to focus. Participating in a drum circle brings social, emotional and cognitive benefits including: increasing cognitive abilities and creating a sense of connection. When the entire group has an opportunity to "sync" up and be something bigger than themselves during drum circles, it strengthens the connections and feelings of belonging with others in the group. A trained drum circle facilitator leads each group in a series of planned exercises.

My own mission to create these drum circles began with meeting Carol Rosenstein, a member of IFRM's Virtual Rotary World Choir (which is still meeting twice monthly), and founder of Music Mends Minds. Music Mends Minds is a 501(c) (3) organization headquartered in Los Angeles created by Rotarian Carol Rosenstein that creates musical support groups for individuals with Alzheimer's, dementia, Parkinson's, traumatic brain injury, PTSD, and other neurological disorders.

Carol's husband Irwin had Parkinson's dementia and was unable to relate to others much – until Carol put him in front of a piano, where Irwin began playing and singing. He began to improve the more he played the piano or saxophone. Carol saw an opportunity to help and created her first band, The Fifth Dementia, in Los Angeles, to provide an opportunity for those with dementia of all types to get together and make music together. Before COVID, Carol had established 18 bands and choruses around the country and Canada; she moved her platform to Zoom when the pandemic broke outCarol and her Music Mends Minds experience is the lead article in the May issue of *Rotary Magazine*. When COVID hit, she went to a Zoom format (still going MWF at 2:30 pm Pacific time). When the pandemic ended, Carol's group started a drum circle in Culver City, California. That is what we decided to emulate here in Northern NJ.

Our first effort took place at the Walk to End Alzheimer's last October in a park in northern NJ. Three clubs banded together to hire a certified drum circle facilitator from Pennsylvania, who led the walkers in a short rhythmic experience. This worked out so well that my Rotary Club, Fair Lawn Sunrise, planned our first drum circle. We had 35 people at the first one and have now held nine of these, including one outdoors that brought children, parents and grandparents together. Other Rotary Clubs followed suit, so Park Ridge Rotary Club, Secaucus Rotary Club, and Fort Lee Rotary Club now hold monthly drum circles of their own. Our Fair Lawn Sunrise Club will actually hold a "first anniversary party" of our drum circles on November 21. Five more clubs: Paterson, Wayne, Tenafly and Paramus Sunrise – will start their own drum circles soon. Thanks to a generous donation of \$2,000 from our own IFRM Foundation, we were able to purchase all types of percussion instruments that clubs can borrow for up to three days. We have

even developed a "library card" that clubs fill out when they borrow the instruments (kept in the office of our District Governor).

At this point, we pay our drum circle facilitators \$150 to \$200/hour. We were able to get DDF funding and funding from our District's own Foundation to start. But so far, we have only two trained drum circle facilitators (one of whom was a Rotarian). So we are working with the Music Department at a local college – William Paterson University in Wayne, NJ – to hold a Fundamentals of Drum Circle Facilitation course October 20-22, to be followed by a huge community drum circle to which everyone is invited. If you are interested int his course, go to http://bit.ly/3OHaRxp. On December 10, we are planning a Reunion of all of our drum circles in our area. We are even working with the Bergen Co. Commissioner on Human Services and the head of a large nursing home group to expand our outreach.


IFRM at the RI Convention in Melbourne, Australia. May 2023

UPDATE

Technology is always changing and it has significantly impacted our website. Our Web Architect, David Loofbourrow is continuing the refinement of our completely redesigned website. We are working on new features including Regional Web Pages within the site. The most exciting new enhancement is the development of "Lift Your Voice" Rotary Musical Database which will be available to members. It will be introduced at the Conventions, actual and virtual. I believe you will find it an incredible resource for music appropriate to Rotary Meetings and gatherings, with the ability to drill down by country of origin, style, where to find the music and even video resources, if they are available. This has been a massive under-taking led by Susan DuPree, a past Global Chair of IFRM and her committee and our web architect. It is designed to grow, but we will need your help in finding music and the requisite permissions.

Membership

Our membership numbers are increasing, many are joining in India due to the continuing work of **Paddy Iyer (Regional Vice Chair India and Sri Lanka**. Currently, IFRM has more than 1400 members in 43 countries of more than 90 are Lifetime Members. We have over 1,500 on the database, but not all of their dues are current so they are not counted as "active" IFRM members. The programmatic addition of IFRM Sings through Zoom has also helped increase our membership as well as our partnership with Music Mends Minds.

Our database is now being maintained by our Membership Chair, **Barry Oxford**. Barry, David and I are working to make the database available to all members.

We continue to try to address some persistent issues:

- ➤ <u>Updating the membership database:</u> All our communication is by e-mail, and we get many "bounces" from sent mail because members do not update their membership information. We encourage all members to go to the website (<u>www.IFRM.org</u>) and update their e-mail address and other information on their profile. Your changes will automatically update on the IFRM database.
- Renewal of dues: Members pay \$35 USD dues for a three-year membership. Dues always expire on June 30—the end of the Rotary year. Please check your profile on the website. After you log in, you can renew online through the membership link on the website. Starting in April of the year membership expires, member receive a reminder notification when they visit the website.
- ➤ Communication with IFRM Membership: As Chair, I publish a bi-monthly e-bulletin, Staccato, as well as a periodic newsletter, Music Notes. We are seeing a slight increase in those who open Stacatto, but it remains less than 40% of our members, who actually open Stacatto. We continue to use Staccato as our best communication tool. All issues of Music Notes are published on our website and can be accessed by going to www.IFRM.org, go to 'newsletters' on the menu bar, and click on the top entry for the latest issue. (You do not

need to sign into the website.) IFRM also has a very active mail list on googlegroups and is another benefit of IFRM membership. If you are not already signed up, you can do so by going to ifrm@googlegroups.com. The link to our Saturday IFRM sings Virtual Choir zoom meetings for the *Virtual* RWC is listed here.
